With the development of the Ad-Lib family we set out to redefine the genre of multi-purpose seating as we recognised changing needs. The family shares the identical seat and back structure that carries the anatomically formed seat and back plates and provides the foundation of the range.

The sled base stacking variant is seen as a general purpose meeting chair but due to the options it has available, is equally at home in social, training, educational and auditorium environments.

The diversity of finish specification options together with the upholstery options give Ad-Lib a truly varied palette.
